In 2019, I had the opportunity to participate in the 150th anniversary of the creation of the Wakamatsu colony, the first settlement of Japanese people in America, about 45 miles from Sacramento. Although the knowledge of this historic site is increasing, many people (myself included) were not aware of the existence of this group of people until recently. This year, we are honoring the 150th anniversary of the death of Okei-san, a young woman who was part of the colony who passed away at the age of 19 in 1871 and who's gravesite has become a place of pilgrimage for Japanese Americans.

I learned a great deal about the Wakamatsu colony from a three-part article in the Rafu Shimpo written by Junko Yoshida as well as an article by Alan Ehrgott, who works for the American River Conservancy. They had done an incredible amount of research and they both are a fascinating read that I recommend anyone interested to look up. If I understand correctly, the Japanese pioneers came to America as a result of the drastic international changes happening in Japan known as the Meiji Restoration. There was a conflict between the Tokugawa shogunate, who favored isolation, and a group who sought to restore authority to the emperor, who favored modernization. Matsudaira Katamori, the daimyo in charge of the Aizu Wakamatsu province, participated in international affairs even though he was part of the isolationist faction. One of his connections was to John Henry Schnell, a member of the Prussian embassy who sold European weapons to Matsudaira and also trained his samurai in the use of firearms. As a sign of respect for his contributions and to strengthen his bond to Japan, Schnell was given a Japanese name and was allowed to marry a Japanese woman.

Eventually, the conflict between the two groups resulted in civil war with the Imperial forces victorious and Matsudaira surrendering in the Battle of Aizu. This put Schnell's life in danger and, with the help of Matsudaira, he traveled to America with other colonists from Wakamatsu along with his wife, their daughter, and a 17-year-old nanny named Okei Ito. After arriving, Schnell purchased a ranch with hopes of cultivating silk and tea. Although initially promising, the colony faced ruin with intrusion of the prospectors during the California Gold Rush whose methods polluted the water necessary for crops. On top of that, there was a severe drought which wiped out their farms. The colony disbanded with some returning to Japan, some dispersing through America, and some staying in the area.

Okei-san was one of the few who stayed after a nearby family named Veerkamp purchased the colony and hired some of the pioneers to work for them. The Veerkamps were themselves immigrants from Germany and Okei-san became a nanny to their six sons. It's said that since they only had sons, they treated Okei-san as their own daughter. Unfortunately, she contracted a terrible fever in the summer of 1871 and passed away three days later. Legend tells that she used to stand on a hilltop to gaze in the direction of her homeland in Aizu Wakamatsu. That is now where her gravesite is located. Today, there is a replica of the marble headstone that was placed several years after she passed by Matsunosuke Sakura, a former samurai who stayed to work on the Veerkamp land. The cost must have been tremendous, but he decided she deserved the honor.

As Okei-san is the first Japanese person to be buried in America, she has become a symbol for future Japanese descendants of the sacrifice immigrants face when searching for a better life in America. I think her life and the Wakamatsu colony have important lessons for us, even 150 years afterwards. We are living today in a time with so much anger, hate, and ignorance of the people around us. Conflicts arise between countries because of international politics, and they arise between people because of the fear that has been stoked by the language used to attack and blame others. The Wakamatsu colony exists because of Japan opening up to the rest of the world. The world today is more international than it ever has been, and we must begin to see ourselves all as global citizens. When the colony fell, it was immigrants that purchased the land and tried to help those who stayed. All of us have our struggles and we should try to help out our fellow travelers when we can, recognizing that there are more similarities between us than differences. Okei-san's untimely passing came during her attempt to be happier, and I believe that the best way we can honor her is to appreciate that we all still have that same wish and to support each other how we can.

This year, we have two scholarship recipients. Our first recipient is Braden Mizusaka. Brayden has been a Dharma School student since 2011. Brayden also played on Florin's basketball teams for 11 years. He is the son of Lenny & Leslie Mizusaka. Braden is a graduate of Inderkum High School in Sacramento, California.



Braden helped at church fundraisers, attended yearly church camping trips and for his senior project, he organized the church library. He has also volunteered in the community at North Natomas Regional Park where he helped with field maintenance.

Braden's hobbies are playing/watching baseball and basketball, playing videos with school and driving! In the Fall, Braden will begin his upper-level education at Sacramento City College. He is undecided on a major. But in the future, he would like to have a job helping athletes train.



Here is Braden's essay:

Buddhism has acted as the support system for the person I am now and who I want to be in the future. The two most significant teachings that I've always carried with me are the three poisons and to just start. These two teachings are daily reminders to me to keep myself in check and to stay motivated. Greed, anger, and selfishness are three aspects of my life that have hindered me, whether it's with friends, in school, or even in Baseball. I always felt like things had to go my way and that I needed attention in order to feel a sense of confirmation, and if I didn't, then I'd feel very upset with myself and others. This brought lots of toxicity to my life. But after this era of COVID, I went back to the teaching's that I once took for granted, and used it to better myself. I wanted to become a more patient and selfless person, and I wanted to be kinder to all living things. "Knowing that on what I do now depends not only my happiness or unhappiness, but also that of

others" is a perfect example of my pursuit of selflessness and avoiding the three poisons. This line has always given me a moment to reflect on my actions and what I've done for others. This helped me gain awareness of my actions, even though I just recently started to really focus on it.

I couldn't be more thankful for Dharma School. It was a humbling yet memorable experience that has allowed me to meet lifelong friends and understand concepts like the three poisons. Events like Undokai and Setsubun really brought the fun to church, where it was usually to sit and listen, here I was able to grow alongside other members my age and create lasting memories. If it wasn't for Dharma School, then I really don't know where

my mind would be and where I'd base my behavior off of. Dharma School allowed me to also become the disciplined person I am, where I'm constantly told that my maturity is beyond my age. Along with the Buddhist teachings assisting me in my daily life, Dharma School shaped me into the person I am. It was where I was able to comprehend the concepts discussed in service and apply it to my daily life. Another impact that Dharma School has had in my life is the connections that I was able to build along the way. Thanks to Dharma School, I was able to reach out to Mrs. Yuki to complete a senior project for school, where I was able to participate in a small part of the Church's restoration or clean-up. Dharma School has given me the ability to become the selfless person that I strive to become, and it will influence me as I grow older in this world. Dharma School will allow me to be a better son, a better student, a better husband, and a better father.

Both Dharma School and Buddhism have allowed me to see things from a different perspective in my life. It has humbled me, and allowed me to understand the appreciation of everything that's been given or earned. A moment in Service that I will never forget is when Reverend Koichi Mizushima guest spoke. He mentioned a line that I always use in order to motivate myself: "Just start". With this ingrained in my mind, I used it to motivate myself in workouts, assignments, and even in my volunteer project for the Church. It allowed me to become more productive and has even been a factor in my motivation to get a job. This quote was truly inspiring to me because of how it essentially tended to my habit of procrastination. Other Dharma School lessons from Reverend Tadao, such as the Eightfold Path, were ones that I initially took for granted. It was only until I fully understood it's purpose that it began to be similar to a set of rules for me to live by, along with "Just start" and the Three Poisons. Dharma School has molded me into becoming a well rounded, caring person. My only wish is for these teachings to allow myself to influence the next generation.

As a person who was born with a lot of pride, resiliency, and strength, I believe that Dharma School and Buddhism has helped act as stepping stones to help me live with my multiple personalities. Dharma School has brought me lifelong friends who I've grown up with, and it is almost surreal that this chapter of our lives is already coming to a close. I'm forever thankful for Dharma School even though I may have taken it for granted in the past, and the lessons from Buddhism that I've been taught are ones that will influence me forever. If I could turn back time, I'd utilize Buddhism more in my life to make others happier, to be less selfish, and to create bonds that could never be broken. However, Buddhism has given me a plan, and that plan was to grow with these teachings. These teachings over time have allowed me to gain a greater understanding for its purpose and why it applies to everyone's lives.

It was no surprise that Devon was accepted to every college he applied for. This Fall, Devon will begin his upper-level education at University of California at Berkeley where his studies will focus on economics and maybe a minor in history. In the future Devon hopes to pursue a career in management.

Other scholarships Dev has received (so far, he tells me) is from Florin JACL, Sacramento Pioneer Association, Sacramento City Teachers Association, East Sacramento Kiwanis Club, Florin Nakatani Scholarship, and this Florin Dharma School scholarship. Wow, great job Devon!

Here's Devon's essay:

I officially joined the Buddhist Church of Florin in 2011 and actively participated on the Florin Basketball team, Sunday services, and Dharma School weekly classes. I remember working on a variety of skills during Dharma School like developing my public speaking from chairing services. However, the skills that have stayed with me the most are the lessons of core Buddhist principles like the Eightfold Path, Impermanence, the Six Paramitas, and even Interconnectedness. I think that it is now in my senior year of High School, marked by quarantine and isolation, that I have relied most on Dharma School lessons in my daily life. Firstly, school itself has always been my number one priority; and I see education as the foundation for a rewarding, productive future. The start of education, however, is not limited to the classroom setting or the virtual platform of distance learning. In fact, for me, it is the lessons from Dharma School, like the Eightfold Path that continue guiding me throughout school and in my pursuit of advanced learning. Practicing the Right View, Thought, and Mindfulness, for example, has given me the motivation to stay focused on my goals and put in the hard work. As a result, even with the demands of four Advanced Placement classes, I have maintained my grades and active school participation, earning a cumulative weighted GPA of 4.34.

A second way in which our Dharma School lessons have supported me is in overcoming the challenges of distance learning on a virtual platform and remaining fully engaged in my school clubs. Remembering the teachings of Impermanence, for instance, has encouraged me to see the temporary conditions of each situation and to aim for appreciating the opportunities that come from those events. One such opportunity resulted from my fascination with history and world relations. Motivated by this interest, I collaborated with friends and founded the first Model United Nations Club at my high school. As the president of a new club created in a COVID environment, I contacted school and student officials to secure an advisor and meeting time for the club. Once created, it was my duty to nurture the club with proper advertisement, biweekly meetings, group discussions, and team bonding events. Recognizing the impermanent nature of the online learning platform, I was actually able to appreciate its flexibility and develop other ways to maintain my club commitments and fully enjoy the activities. More than just at school, the Dharma School teachings are also supportive in my community service as well.

I enjoy engaging in off-campus extracurricular organizations and have continued my active participation during the shutdown. One of the highlights of these activities has been earning my Eagle Scout rank, the highest in Boy Scouts. In a strict COVID environment, I completed my Eagle Service Project to restore the Florin outdoor kitchen while adapting to new quarantine guidelines. The church has supported me and my family for several generations, and the Sangha has helped raise me on essential Buddhist principles. One of the most memorable of these is the Six Paramitas, more specifically, Dana or selfless giving. With that in mind, my Eagle Project was developed to express my gratitude and to help our church. Finishing under budget and ahead of schedule, the project helped to beautify a central part of the property and will support the Sangha for years to come. Additionally, the idea of dana has helped to shape the entirety of my high school experience. In four years, I have accomplished almost 1,000 hours of community service to help those around me, something that I can connect back to my early days volunteering on projects with Dharma School.

These projects, which have included food bazaars, omigaki cleaning of the onaijin, and pancake breakfasts, have given me many opportunities to practice the idea of Interdependence. Working together with other Dharma School students and Sangha members, I have grown up with an appreciation for the collective impact we can have while supporting our church through fundraisers and regular maintenance. The celebration of annual Jodo Shinshu holidays and special events have also reinforced the concept of Interdependence and our connections to each other. For instance, as a member of the Florin Dharma School every year since elementary school, I have joined other DS students in many Hanamatsuri Service celebrations including Hanamido preparations, plays, and craft projects. For this year's celebration, I had the chance to help with a photo presentation featuring former ministers, guest speakers, and DS students at previous Hanamatsuri Services. Seeing those photos, I appreciate how close knit our church community is and how we have continued to practice Interdependence over the years and under many different circumstances. Buddhism, and more specifically Dharma School, teach us that we are all together in this world, and especially in a time marked by separation, it is vital to continue and embrace the bonds created within the Buddhist Community.

The COVID-19 pandemic has impacted us all in ways that could not have been predicted. Reflecting on this experience, I realize how proud I am of everything that I accomplished and the challenges that I overcame. It is because of the teachings from Dharma School of the Eightfold path, Impermanence, the Six Paramitas, and Interdependence that I have been able to become an active and hard-working member of my community.
