One of the interesting things that I learned in my high school physics class that I still remember today for some reason, is that in physics, there is no such thing as "cold". What we understand as "heat" is the kinetic energy being given off by any particular thing. Things that we think are "cold" have much less kinetic energy and therefore lack "heat". An example of this would be if you put ice cubes in a warm drink, the "cold" in the ice doesn't transfer making the drink cold; rather the "heat" in the drink transfers to the ice cubes to warm them up. It seems like a trivial matter, but when looking at things as a physicist with the understanding of the world as full of energy, it is an important distinction. I think the reason this stuck with me is because it really challenged my view on the world in that the way I thought the world operated on the atomic scale was actually quite different. Of course, day to day this didn't really affect me since I still use the word "cold" and put jackets on and so forth. But this notion that there aren't two opposites that exist but rather just one thing that is either there or lacking carried over into my studies in Buddhism and perhaps made it a bit easier to comprehend.

An example of this would be pleasure and pain. I think probably most people would agree that these are two very distinct things that are diametrically opposed. Thus, as humans, we are drawn to that which will bring us pleasure and try to avoid that which will bring us pain. There is the presence of the two within Abhidharma Buddhism when talking about our fleeting sensory experiences. However, this is different than ultimate reality which is permanent. And perhaps, if I may, it might be better for us to get closer to that reality by understanding our experiences as simply painful and painless. I offer this explanation as recognizing that our idea of "pleasurable" things comes from our ego and selfishness to have that which is pleasing to us. When we remove the self-attachment and selfishness from it, we see that there are simply things which cause us pain and that which do not. To go back to the original example of heat and cold, if we touch ice to our face on a cold day, it doesn't feel good. But if we touch the same ice to our face on a hot day, it feels fantastic. There is no difference in the ice, the difference is what we want at the time. When we remove our attachment to how much we want to feel a certain way, we can say it in another way: that we no longer have the craving for pleasure. And thus, our experiences are just about pain and painlessness. In the greater scope of life and of Buddhism, it cuts to the core of the teaching of lessening the suffering of all beings. I hope that changing our view and understanding of how we interact with the world may help us suffer less. Inevitable as it may be for us to suffer, the Dharma helps us see that relinquishing our selfishness is what we need to ease it.


I shall look to Amida's Guiding Light. As I reflect upon my imperfect self, I live with gratitude for the Perfect Compassion which surrounds me at all times.

Governing Board Meeting Highlights Meeting Date: May 16, 2021

Fundraisers: *Jennifer Kubo* reported the "Teriyaki, Chicken Plate Drive Thru" on May 2nd was successful, and sold 454 plates. Next Food Bazaar will be on September 12, 2021. *Eric Fujii* reported on the BCF Golf Tournament, June 3, 2021 at Teal Bend Golf Club is in full swing.

First Vice President, Margie Sunahara: Continues to be responsible for use and security of BCF facilities and grounds. Picks up mail weekly from the US Post Office Box. She will be scheduling a BCF Calendar meeting in July.

Treasurer, Kathy Menda: All affiliates were reminded that the first quarterly reports for 2021 were due April 30th. Kathy also reported that the church was notified by the Sacramento Regional Solid Waste Authority that we needed to secure bins for recycling and organic waste. She contacted Waste Management and was able to order a reduced waste bin size (4 yard bin to 3 yard bin) to avoid the recycling and organic waste bins.

BWA, Peggy Okabayashi: BWA chaired the May 9th Shotsuki/Gotan-ye Service. The Elk Grove Food Bank – Cathy's Closet and SPCA were the recipients of April Dana Projects.

Devon Akiyama is the recipient of the \$8,000 scholarship

Devon is graduating from West Campus High School, where he excelled as a scholar with a 4.3 grade point average. His academic achievements include Commended National Merit Scholar, Advanced Placement Scholar with Distinction, and Indigenous Scholar from the College Board Indigenous Recognition Program (Native Hawaiian). He volunteered at school, serving leadership roles on various school organizations including the Model United Nations, which he founded and was the President; the National Honor Society; the California Scholarship Federation; the Math, Engineering, Science, Achievement (MESA); and Lieutenant Governor of the Key Club with oversight over 17 schools in the Sacramento area. He is an Eagle Scout in the Boy Scouts of America providing service in the community and at church. Devon regularly participates at church activities and fundraisers; chairing and giving reflections at Sunday services; writing articles for the church's newsletter; and actively participating in the church's YBA as its President. Devon received the Buddhist Church of Florin's Kansha awards (twice) for his altruism to the Temple and members; and the Tamazo Tanigawa awards (twice) in recognition of his outstanding service in the community.

Devon will be attending the University of California, Berkeley, majoring in Business Administration.

Devon is the son of church members, George and Merri Akiyama.

In his scholarship essay, Devon wrote, "Growing up at the Buddhist Church of Florin, I have had the opportunity to observe many aspects of the Six Paramitas, the six virtues to practice on the Eightfold Path. Some of the virtues, like meditation and diligence, are easy to identify. However, Selfless Giving (*dana*), is something that is much more complex and a virtue that I have learned through my experiences at church.

The food bazaars are an excellent example of this selfless giving. With week-long preparations to ensure a successful fundraiser, the Sangha members demonstrate their commitment to the church and their dedication to its continued prosperity. Growing up, I had the chance to participate at bazaars by filling sushi boxes, transporting rice, and greeting customers.

Since then, I have been given more opportunities to serve and learn about my own potential for contributing selflessly to the church. As a member of the Young Buddhist Association (YBA), I have had the chance to exercise *dana* to a greater community, most recently by distributing holiday gift bags to Keiro members of the church.

As an Eagle Scout candidate, it was important to me to develop a service project that would positively impact my church and support the expressions of *dana* I have witnessed all these years. My project included restoring and beautifying the exterior of the Outdoor Kitchen. The kitchen is an integral part of the food bazaars and continues to serve our congregation through fundraisers.

Across my activities as a Buddhist youth, I have learned many principles including the Eightfold Path, the Four Noble Truths, and the Six Paramitas. I try to apply these lessons regularly, but it is watching one specific virtue in motion, *dana*, which inspires me to better give back to my community and one which I will strive to practice throughout my life."


