HANASU

There are two Japanese verbs:「話す(talk)」「放す(let go)」

Both of these verbs are pronounced "HANASU". Talking and letting something go seem different, but they are actually connected. My friend, who is a counselor, said that "talking" to someone also means "letting go" of something inside of us. After we confide our worries to someone, we feel a little more at ease and have more space in our minds. If we can gain space in our minds, we may be able to receive new things and have the desire to try new things. It's just like when you have a lot of things in your hands, you can't receive anything. In this way, it seems that letting go is very important. In Buddhism, there is a word called "attachment," and it is the idea that you should let go.

There is a story about a person named Genza who is called a "Myo-ko-nin." ("Myo-ko-nin." is the name given to people who are happier than others to encounter Buddhism in their lives and live with the Nembutsu.) One of the "Myo-ko-nin" was a man called Genza who was a member of the Jodo Shinshu sect. Genza had a cow and walked with it. He had a lot of luggage in his hands. He also had some luggage on the cow's back. When Genza got tired of walking, he put everything he had in his hands on the cow's back. At that moment, when he saw the cow continue to walk without slowing down, he noticed something. The luggage that he felt was too heavy for a human being was nothing to the cow. At that moment, he realized the importance of relying on others and the limitations of self-reliance.

Buddha tells us that "attachment is something that should be let go," but our desire to not let go of our family, our house, our money, and everything else does not disappear. It may be important to learn that Our life is precious and wonderful because you are alive now, rather than worrying about losing the temporary illusions that surround you, because the treasures around you will one day be let go.

I have heard two interesting questions. If the question was, "Would you accept ten million dollars?" I think most people would have no reason to refuse. However, if the question was, "Would you accept ten million dollars if you could die tomorrow instead?", more people would not accept it. This means that tomorrow is worth more than ten million dollars. We are surrounded by many things we do not want to let go of, but we are blessed to receive the life that we do not want to let go of the most every day. Last month's quiz answers

The word tempura is said to come from the Portuguese word tempero, which means to cook.

There are other theories, such as that it comes from the Spanish word tempuro (temple). Or there is also a theory that it is a phonetic reading of Abura, which means oil, written as 天(Ama)麩(Fu/Pu)羅(La).

Gengō - Era names in Japan

A Japanese era name is a title used for numbering years in the Japanese calendar system. For example, 2018 was Heisei 30.

From the Meiji period onward, it became the rule to change era names only when a new emperor acceded to the throne. Until then, era names were often changed to drive away bad luck and to signal a fresh start after natural disasters. Your era name, and the era names of your parents and grandparents may all be different.

Dear Sangha,

Our temple has historically been a gathering place for our Sangha and I'm happy to see that we are continuing that tradition by providing a variety of activities for all to enjoy. Have you looked at our church calendar lately? There is lots to choose from: Sensei Imada leads a Buddhist discussion group and monthly Japanese study classes. If you're interested in gardening, the Lotus Club meets on Thursdays. Our BWA hosts many so-cial and craft-making events. And, if you are into sports or would just like to be more active, we have pickleball and volleyball, or you can join kyudo kai, and kendo. I encourage you to join us!

I'd also like to update you on the following:

- 1. BCF Board: In May I provided you information regarding proposed changes to our BCF Constitution and Bylaws related to 1) the August election of the BCF Governing Board; 2) the reduction of the number of Sangha Groups from 3 to 1; and 3) a corresponding reduction in the number of Sangha Representatives (eg Directors' At Large) from 6 to 2. The Sangha was asked to vote on these proposals which were put forward to address the limited resources available to fill our BCF positions. Thank you to those of you who voiced your opinions and submitted your vote. The overwhelming majority voted to move forward with the proposals and we are in the process of filling the BCF Board positions at this time. Also, based on input provided by our members, the number of Sangha Groups and Representatives will only be reduced from 3 to 1, with 2 Sangha Representatives acting as liaisons between the Sangha and the Board. An announcement regarding our new Board Mentees will be forthcoming.
- 2. BCF Website: On June 30, 2024 our new Website (<u>buddhistchurchofflorin.org</u>) went LIVE! Along with a new web address, the new site provides increased functionality, including the ability to submit orders and payments online for our various fundraisers. While orders and payments will continue to be accepted "the old fashioned way", the online system will help move the BCF towards providing greater access and service to all users. The September Food Bazaar is first to launch the new system. Membership dues and donations can also be made on the Website. We have been talking about updating our Website for years and we finally did it! A huge thanks to Gary Takeuchi, Jan Takeuchi and their team for making this a reality for the BCF.
- 3. **Reverend Imada Status:** In partnership with the BCA, we continue to work to extend his work visa with the ultimate goal of obtaining a permanent solution. At this point, Reverend Imada will be able to remain with us into September 2024.

Buddhist Church of Florin Governing Board Meeting Highlights



- 1. IT'S LIVE!! The new temple website is live. Please check it out at buddhistchurchofflorin.org for information about our temple, organizations, events, and more are available. Soon the ability to participate/order/pay for fundraising events will be active. Visit the site regularly for updates!
- 2. Elections: The move to change the number of Sangha groups from 3 to 1 passed. The Board for 2024-26 will be announced in the next newsletter.
- 3. Sacramento Kendo's 57th Anniversary tournament was held in the gym on Sunday, June 23rd and was well attended with over 110 participants. Special attendance by the Sacramento Sheriff's Office deputies highlighted their cordial relationship with both the Sacramento Dojo and the Buddhist Church of Florin. A team manager for Team USA Kendo also attended. The event was a Channel 3 television news blurb (the video is posted on the temple website (BuddhistChurchOfFlorin.org).
- 4. Contingency plans have been made in the event of excessive heat during the Obon celebration.
- 5. Three maintenance activities will be occurring in late July or August. The carpet in the hallway and library will be replaced, the carpet in the Hondo and foyer will be cleaned, and the tile floors on the south side of the building will be stripped and waxed. Prior to these activities we will be asking for help to move books and shelves from the library and the tables and chairs from the MPR. Please be generous with your time.
- 6. The Eagle Scout project to add a dry pond, path and lanterns that was schedule for late May will begin August 3.
- 7. In mid- to late August Rev. Imada will be hosting Rev. Hirooka from Japan who is conducting a joint research project with Tsutomu Tomotsune of Tokyo University. Rev. Hirooka would like to learn about the travel history of Fukui Prefecture immigrants from the Florin Buddhist Church, their experiences before and after the wartime internment, and their current situation. - 8. Junior YBA will host a Panda Express fundraiser on August 16.




